### What is a Federal Advisory Committee?

The Federal Advisory Committee Act of 1972 and its amendments provide strict rules including:

- Meeting notices are posted in the Federal Register prior to each meeting
- Meeting are open to the public
- Public comments are encouraged and accepted

## Duties of the National Commission on Forensic Science (NCFS) per its Charter

#### **Duties include:**

- 1. To recommend priorities for standards development to the Attorney General;
- To review and recommend that the Attorney General endorse guidance identified or developed by subject-matter experts;
- 3. To develop proposed guidance concerning the intersection of forensic science and the courtroom;
- 4. To develop policy recommendations, including a uniform code of professional responsibility and minimum requirements for training, accreditation and/or certification;
- To consider the recommendations of the National Science and Technology Council's Subcommittee on Forensic Science;
- 6. To identify and assess the current and future needs of the forensic sciences to strengthen their disciplines and meet growing demands.

#### NCFS Membership

- The Commission is co-chaired by Jim Cole, Deputy Attorney General and Pat Gallagher, Director of NIST.
- Members were appointed by the Attorney General in consultation with the Director of the National Institute of Standards and Technology.
- Members were selected to achieve a diversity of experiences, including Federal, State, and Local forensic science service providers; research scientists and academicians; Federal, State, Local prosecutors, defense attorneys and judges; law enforcement; and other relevant stakeholders. DOJ encouraged submissions from diverse applicants with respect to backgrounds, professions, ethnicities, gender, and geography.
- The Commission comprises 37 members who serve as Special Government Employees without compensation.
- The Commission plans to meet four times each year at approximately three-month intervals.

#### First NCFS Meeting

- February 3-4, 2014
- 810 7<sup>th</sup> Street, NW, Washington DC (NIJ building)
- Open to public (up to ~150 can attend in person)
  - Will have a public comment period each day
- Notice will be published in Federal Register at least two weeks before meeting
- Plan to discuss accreditation, certification, and proficiency testing
- Plan to review NIST progress with guidance groups

#### NIST Guidance Groups

- Under the DOJ-NIST Memorandum of Understanding announced in February 2013, NIST is responsible for developing "guidance groups", which are intended to replace the current SWGs (Scientific Working Groups)
- NIST collected public comments via a Federal Register Notice of Inquiry (NOI) Sept 27 to Nov 26, 2013 (~85 responses)
- A summary of the NOI responses and NIST plan will be shared in a Feb 4, 2014 presentation to NCFS
- A series of public presentations are planned for upcoming AAFS, IAI, NAME, AFTE, and SOFT meetings
